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# **FAQs of the Month**

# I am enrolled in one winter course at VT, but no longer want to take it. How do I drop the course?

• Students are not able to drop their final credits for a term through Hokie Spa. To drop all of your enrolled winter credits, use the <a href="Resignation/Withdrawal">Resignation/Withdrawal</a> form.

### I'm interested in doing undergraduate research. How do I get started?

- The first thing to keep in mind is that **you need to be proactive about getting involved.** The VT Office of Undergraduate Research has a <u>roadmap</u> for getting started.
- The majority of AOE faculty conduct research. But, undergrad research opportunities are not typically advertized. Look at the <u>faculty webpages</u> to get an idea of how their research areas connect with your interests. Reach out to faculty about getting involved by talking to them during office-hours or sending professional emails.
- Research can be done on a volunteer basis, for credit (typically 1-3 credits), or for pay. If you are just getting started with a research group, doing it for credit or as a volunteer is most realistic. To have research credits count towards your AOE general technical electives, you must do the research in A-F grade mode under the "AOE" course designation. Check out the <u>COE Undergraduate Research and Independent Study</u> website for more information about enrolling in research for credit.
- Even if research is not done for technical elective credit, it is a great way to gain experience. If you don't need the tech elective credit, you can also work with faculty from other departments.

### Wait... Is it really ok for me to email a professor I've never met before?

- Yes, it's really ok!
- Email tips: Be polite and professional. Introduce yourself (year, major). Mention if you are currently in one of their classes or have been previously. Consisely explain why you are interested in doing undergrad research and what interests you about the faculty member's research. Thank them and ask about meeting to discuss research further.
